## Input

Input starts with an integer T ( $\leq$  10000), denoting the number of test cases.

Each case starts with a line containing two integers **n**, **m** ( $0 \le n$ , **m**  $\le 2^{60}$ ).

## Output

For each case, print the output generated by the code.
